6—De Gaulle faces setback in French elections, faces runoff.

7—McNamara moves to scrap B58s, close or consolidate 149 military bases.

8—Pope Paul VI issues decrees charting the course of the Catholic Church in the Space Age.

9—Security affairs expert McGeorge Bundy leaves White House staff to head up Ford Foundation.

Moscow mobs demonstrate against American policies in Viet Nam.

Shakeup in Kremlin hierarchy: Mikoyan retires as Soviet Union president; Deputy Premier Shelepin is relieved of his post.

10—Johnson again tenders peace branch in Viet Nam war by ruling out, for the time being, bombing of Hanoi.

15—Man's greatest cosmic adventure: Four U. S. astronauts in Gemini-6 and Gemini-7 rendezvous in space, their spacecraft only 10 feet apart.
